Cal State LA's History Society To Host Mesoamerican Symposium April 21-22

LOS ANGELES, CALIF. — Cal State LA's Art History Society, in partnership with the Los Ange-les County Museum of Art, presents the 2017 Mesoamerican Symposium, "The Foundation of Heaven: The Great Temple of the Aztecs" April 21-22. The symposium will feature leading schol-ars in the field, as well as an inaugural exhibit of antique books of Mesoamerica and Colonial Mexi-

Thisque books of alsosamerica and Colonian succi-co. The symposium is dedicated to the life and work of Eduardo Matos Moctezuma, a prominent Mexi-can archaeologist. Moctezuma, is recognized for his work directing the massive, multidisciplinary Tem-plo Mayor Project (1978–2001). The project was to excavate the Great Aztec Temple of the island capi-tal of Tenochtilan, next to the Metropolitan Cathe-dral and the Zócalo, Mexico City's famous central plazes. He also conducted field work in such revered places as Tula, Comalcaleo, Cholula, Teothinacen and Tiateloleo. Moctezuma published more than 500 articles, exhibition catalogs and monographs. The program will take place Friday, April 21, 9 am to 6 pm, at Los Angeles County Museum of Art, Bing Theater, and Saturday, 8:30 to 7, at Cal State LA, Golden Eagle Ballroom.

The symposium will culminate April 22 at 5 pm in the University Library with an exhibit of antique books, "Transcultural Dialogues: The Books of Mesoamerica and Colonial Mexico." This exhibit will showcase the Ruwet, Glass and Nicholson col-lections of Cal State LA that are an integral part of

lections of Cal State LA that are an integral part of a proposed center for the advancement of Meso-american Studies. The collections of books from the Seventeenth through Twenty-First Centuries include most of the facsimiles of Mesoamerican Codices and his-torical chronicles of Colonial Mexico. This makes Cal State LA's library one of the top repositories in the world in the fields of pre-Columbian and colo-nial history of the American continent. The exhibit is curated by Cal State LA's art history Professor Manuel Aguilar-Moreno, along with Azalea Cama-



cho and Angelene Campuzano. Symposium speakers include Elizabeth Boone of Symposium speakers include Elizabeth Boone of Tulane University, David Carrnsco of the Harvard Divinity School; John D. Pohl of the Anthropology Department at Cal State LA; Karl Taube of the University of California, Riverside; and more.
