I was born in Bastrop, a small farming and ranching community, 30 miles east of Austin, Texas. I was the third son in a family of four boys. My parents moved to Gallup, New Mexico around 1942 and I really don't know how we survived there, but after 4 years our family moved to Belen, New Mexico. When we were in the fourth grade we moved again, for the last time, to Albuquerque where I graduated from high school and college.

At the University of New Mexico I majored in Education and Spanish and after graduation I taught Spanish at a junior high school for about four years. At this time I decided to return to the university to do graduate work in Spanish and linguistics and earned my Master's. At the urging of one of my professors, Dr. Raymond MacCurdy, I decided to apply to several universities to work on a Ph.D. in Spanish and linguistics. I was accepted by several schools, among them UCLA, where I decided to enroll and I completed my doctorate in 1976. This was a memorable year for me; I completed my Ph.D., got my first job as a professor, and married my wife Mary. My life has exceeded all expectations I ever had for myself. I had no idea how wonderful my family would be. My wife has been such a great support and we've had memorable times together. We have two children, Belen and Carlos, who are our pride and joy. They have surprised us and they have pleased us, but they have never caused us grief or worry.

As for my work, it's hard to remember a day when I didn't want to come to the university. When I retired I was a little concerned because I didn't know how my life would change. However, I found out that I have more to do than I ever imagined and I have taken up mountain climbing as a hobby in addition to other interests. This past year I climbed two 14,000 foot peaks, Mt. Whitney in California and Mt. Quandary in Colorado. Retirement seems like another career, and I'm loving every minute of it.
