Subject:	Proposed Modification to Curricular Policies - Chapter IV of the Faculty Handbook (EPC Memo 20-06)

In light of EO 1071 which mandates each graduate program to have a common core of more than 50% of the total units required by the program, the EPC proposes the following modifications to the Curricular Policies. Here are the rationales for the proposed changes:

- Line 5: The word GRADUATE is added to make sure the policy covers graduate programs as well.
- Lines 6-15: These lines are deleted since a more general language will cover this part.
- Lines 15-20: The language is added here to state that the 50% rule is applied to both undergraduate and graduate programs.
- Line 25: The word APPROPRIATE is added since the policy is applied to both undergraduate and graduate programs and each one will be reviewed by the appropriate committee.
- Line 28: The GRADUATE STUDIES SUBCOMMITTEE is added here since this subcommittee is in charge of graduate programs.

1 Curricular Policies

Responsibility for the development of the curriculum rests with the faculty, subject to system guidelines in
the Administrative Code, Title 5, and in other pertinent statutory documents.

4 New degree programs, including options and concentrations, are projected on the University's Academic

5 Master Plan prior to their detailed design. Undergraduate AND GRADUATE degree programs with

6 options, concentrations, or special emphases must have a <u>common core requirement of at least five</u>

7 courses. Departments/divisions/schools may request a variance based on the standards of the

8 <u>discipline. This variance must be approved through academic governance processes. Each graduate</u>

9 degree program with options, concentrations or special emphases must include a common core

10 experience. Each college within the University must establish a policy defining acceptable core

11 experiences. Each college within the University must establish a policy defining acceptable core

12 experiences for graduate degrees within the college. This college policy shall be subject to approval by

13 the Curriculum Subcommittee and the Educational Policy Committee. Justification for their addition to the

14 program is developed concurrently, in terms of academic and professional needs, student and community

15 interests, and fiscal feasibility. MAJOR OR PROGRAM CORE THAT COMPRISES MORE THAN 50

16 PERCENT OF THE TOTAL UNITS REQUIRED FOR THE PROGRAM. THE MAJOR CORE OR

17 PROGRAM CORE IS THE SET OF COURSES REQUIRED OF ALL STUDENTS PURSUING A

18 DEGREE PROGRAM AND SHOULD REPRESENT THE MAJORITY OF REQUIRED UNITS SO THAT

19 THE PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES CAN BE ACHIEVED BY ALL ENROLLED STUDENTS,

20 REGARDLESS OF SUBPROGRAM. Modifications in existing courses and programs also are given

21 formal consideration, and all programs are reviewed in an ongoing process which has a five-year cycle.

22 The curriculum has both residence and external components and includes undergraduate and graduate

23 segments. Courses, degree, and certificate programs and modifications thereof are proposed by the

24 faculty in the respective disciplines or interdisciplinary areas. Following departmental/divisional/school

25 approval, these proposals are reviewed by the APPROPRIATE c<u>C</u>ommittee of the corresponding college.

- 26 At the university level, new major programs, options, minor/credential programs and certificates and
- 27 resolution of unresolved challenges to curricular modifications are considered by THE Curriculum
- 28 Subcommittee OR GRADUATE STUDIES SUBCOMMITTEE. The subcommittee submits approved
- 29 proposals to the Educational Policy Committee, where the curricular actions stand approved unless
- 30 questioned and agendized for further consideration.
