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## BACKGROUND 82

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On September 17, 2020, President Donald J. Trump announced his intention to sign an executive 84 85 order creating a national commission to promote what he referred to as "patriotic education." In rationalizing his decision to create the order, he stated: 86

The narratives about America being pushed by the far left and being chanted in the streets 87 bear a striking resemblance to the anti-American propaganda of our adversaries, because 88 both groups want to see America weakened, derided, and totally diminished. Students in 89 our universities are inundated with Critical Race Theory. This is a Marxist document [*sic*] 90 holding that America is a wicked and racist nation, that even young children are 91 complicit in oppression, and that our entire society must be radically transformed. Critical 92 Race Theory is being forced into our children's schools, it's being imposed into 93 workplace trainings, and it's being deployed to rip apart friends, neighbors, and families. 94 95

## **President Trump, White House Conference on American History**

96 Five days later, mimicking language that would traditionally reflect concerns associated with the

concerns of marginalized communities and their experiences with institutionalized bigotry, the 97

98 president signed Executive Order 13950: Combating Race and Sex Stereotyping.

99 As progressive as the EO's title might sound, the order actually threatens to economically gut programs designed to combat institutional racial and sex-based oppression. Targeting critical 100

studies writ large, undoubtedly EO19350 is intended to erode the knowledge base of public 101

university students across the board. However, it is specifically designed to target the humanities 102

by demanding (through financial extortion) that foundational theories/theorists central to the 103

104 study of literature, philosophy, history, human geography, law, political science, the arts and

media entertainment studies be censored from the curriculum. This includes, but is not limited to 105

- theories/theorists associated with historical criticism, critical race theory, feminism, post-106
- feminism, critical culturalism, Marxism, neo-Marxism, post-structuralism, post-modernism, 107

deconstructionism, queer theory, and post-colonialism. The order withholds federal support from 108

- any funding recipient engaged in the teaching, training or instruction of institutional oppression, 109 as well as theories regarding how it functions and replicates. Thus, EO 13950 impacts our 110
- university at every level of the CSULA community: from students and faculty, to staff, 111
- administrators and any organization with whom we partner. 112
- Arguably, the expressed purpose of the order is to censor and defund what President Trump 113
- defines as "anti-American" propaganda and training. Towards that end, his administration 114
- identified what they called "divisive concepts" now declared "disqualifying factors" for any 115
- institution, organization, contractor or subcontractor seeking federal support. 116
- Many of the "divisive concepts" identified in Sec 2 of the order are foundational axioms within 117
- critical theory and impulses underwriting inquiry within the humanities. These "divisive 118
- concepts" to which the order refers exclude any future recipient of federal funds from including 119
- in their curriculum, research pursuits, staff and faculty training, employment and other 120
- operational functions anything designed to address or redress the following beliefs: 121

- 1) one race or sex is inherently superior to another race or sex: 122 2) the United States is fundamentally racist or sexist; 123 3) an individual, by virtue of his or her race or sex, is inherently racist, sexist, or 124 oppressive, whether consciously or unconsciously; 125 4) an individual should be discriminated against or receive adverse treatment solely or 126 partly because of his or her race or sex; 127 5) members of one race or sex cannot and should not attempt to treat others without 128 respect to race or sex; 129 6) an individual's moral character is necessarily determined by his or her race or sex; 130 7) an individual, by virtue of his or her race or sex, bears responsibility for actions 131 committed in the past by other members of the same race or sex; 132 8) any individual should feel discomfort, guilt, anguish, or any other form of 133 psychological distress on account of his or her race or sex; or 134 9) meritocracy or traits such as a hard work ethic are racist or sexist, or were created by a 135 particular race to oppress another race. 136 10) The term "divisive concepts" also includes any other form of race or sex stereotyping 137 138 or any other form of race or sex scapegoating. 139 In a recently published assessment of this order by the National Law Review, Schaengold, 140 Schipma and Muenzfeld forewarn "Because the E.O. identifies potentially significant 141 consequences for violations of the prohibitions contained therein, federal contractors and 142
- subcontractors, as well as federal grant recipients, should carefully assess and monitor their
- 144 compliance with the E.O. requirements."
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
