The Office of Graduate Studies helps graduate students to consider the formatting and submission of their thesis, project report, or dissertation manuscripts as part of their professionalization, a process which prepares their work for publication and for its use as a public good. Thesis reviewers support this professional development through one-on-one appointments, which aim to be welcoming and inclusive to students with a variety life experiences, technical skills, and knowledge of academic publishing. A multi-tiered review of the culminating project, via the faculty committee, the thesis reviewer, and the GRC Coordinator/University Thesis & Dissertation Coordinator, provides a thorough process that ultimately boosts the quality of manuscripts filed with the University, and therefore the academic distinction of its graduate programs. Theses reviewers are a vital part of this process and the continued success of our graduate students.

Overall, the program supports graduate student success. Thesis reviewers help to demystify the thesis formatting and submission process for graduating students. Thesis reviewers serve as a resource to them in addition to the thesis coordinator and their thesis committee chair.

Challenges encountered:

The biggest challenge for this role involves hiring and retention, especially in the spring semester. There is a great deal of turnover for this position because graduate students tend to finish their programs in 2 years or less. Sometimes graduate students find other roles offering more than 10 hours per week. The thesis coordinator needs to train new thesis reviewers thoroughly in order for them to be effective in their work. Training involves an overview of thesis formatting and submission process, an overview of the Office of Graduate Studies and its place in the ogranizational structure of the thesis subsmission process, email guidelines, document preparation and editing, permissions (IRB, copyright, etc.), communication practices, and student-facing consulting practice. If thesis reviewers are not fully onboarded, they might miss critical errors that need correction or provide students with incorrect procedures to follow. Having to do this training nearly every semester because of turnover rates takes away from the time that the reviewers are able to hold appointments with students.
