During the break between the posters and ceremony, grab a cup of coffee and a snack, then find your seat, relax, enjoy, and celebrate.







Learn More about the Honors College

Community Engagement and Leadership: During 2023–24, Honors College students completed a record-setting 5,188 community service hours. This year we are on track to exceed that number. In their service, Honors College students joined the larger, incredibly engaged, Cal State LA student body by donating food staples to the Cal State LA Food Pantry, tutoring peers through academic student clubs, providing health and wellness education as certified health peer educators, and advocating for needs of underrepresented students. Honors College students also went into greater LA to create and distribute food packages; worked in local schools; served as first responders; supported youth writing; volunteered at PIH Good Samaritan Hospital and the Armenia Relief Society; collected clothes and feminine products for donation to the L.A. Mission; and distributed books to indigenous youth.

Campus Events: The Honors College builds networks and friendships that support student participation in unique Honors events—like group attendance at Shakespeare in the Park in Griffith Park—and campus—wide events like Career Center networking, lectures, and on campus music and theater.

Grant: The Honors College has a grant with historically Black Tuskegee University. We are working to explore the ways our universities approach and teach topics related to character and leadership and expect to apply for another grant in 2026.

Human Rights: Cal State LA is making a great impression—and building student opportunities—thanks to its relationship with the Oxford Consortium for Human Rights. Five students attended a workshop in Sonoma, CA, in January 2024, and 3 attended a workshop at Oxford University on Oxford, UK, in March, 2025. We have plans to attend another workshop in September, 2025.

Peace and the Nobel Prize: We are Partners in Peace! The Honors College was selected as an inaugural member of the National Collegiate Honors Council's Partners in Peace. We also participated in our first ever World Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates in September, 2025, traveling with 2 faculty and 5 students to Monterrey, Mexico, where we joined hundreds of students and peace leaders from around the world.
