Admission Requirements

Completion of 60 semester units of baccalaureate-level coursework or its equivalent.

Or, consent of the Director of the Applied Gerontology Institute (for undecided majors or students enrolling through the College of Professional and Global Education).

The Program

The certificate program requires 21 units:

Field Experience/Internship:

HHS 4950 Field Work in Health and Human Services
(Valentine Villa Section)

The Field Work component consists of 3 units of field experience. The field experience provides an opportunity to synthesize and apply one's discipline preparation with information and knowledge acquired in the core. 90 hours are required.

The field experience will generally be taken in the student's major area of study. Non-matriculated students will be placed in agencies specific to their area of expertise or to their career goals.
