The History Department has hosted several scholarly events, invited talks, and symposia in the spring semester of 2023.






DEPARTMENT NEWS





A Higher Standard: Compassion and Higher Expectations

One of the things I have heard from my students lately is that I give a lot of work, and that for 2000 and 3000 level courses, I demand too much. To me, it means that I am doing something right. College is meant to be difficult, rewarding, and fun. I make sure to present my courses where my students are challenged, rewarded, and have fun learning in the process. I explain to my students that it does not matter to me whether they are here at **Cal State LA**, or at a higher tier school; my expectation is the same as if I was teaching my own child. We must as instructors hold our students to a higher standard. We must be strict, but also compassionate, have higher expectations, while at the same understanding their specific needs. I expect much from my students, but I also expect them to demand much from myself as well. Teaching is a community dialogue between students and instructor. We, as instructors, must demand the very most from them, and provide them with the very best of ourselves.

Students must realize that they are not getting a participation trophy merely because they attend class, but rather they must earn their grade. The first step, as I tell my daughter who is about to embark in her own college journey, is to attend class (and meet the instructor during office hours). Second, do the work. Just by doing those two things, you have already won two thirds of the battle. Doing the work means doing the reading, going over the notes, and turning in your work on time. The last third is of course studying for tests. If we teach students to hold themselves accountable to a higher standard, and if we as instructors have compassion, listen to them, and have high expectations in terms of their work and their learning ability, they will surprise us. As instructors, we wish, and we hope, that all our students would listen to us, and follow our advice, but there are always those who exceed our expectations. They are the ones that make it all worthwhile. I teach them all the same as if they are that one student who shines brightly. We never know which student will blossom because we took the time to demand more from him or her, but when the opportunity presents itself, we must be ready to help. We need to constantly ask ourselves: am I holding myself and my students to a higher standard? The answer, to me at least, should always be yes.
