MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Higher education today is preoccupied with “career readiness.” From the American Historical Association to the CSU system, leaders are calling for career-relevant education.¹ Some even argue that skill-oriented “microcredentials” should replace traditional liberal arts degrees.² But what exactly is career readiness, especially for history majors?

At Cal State LA, a majority of our History faculty have participated in workshops on career readiness. Some of us, myself included, now devote class time to cover letters, résumés, and mock interviews. We want to help students see how

historians’ analytical toolbox prepares history majors for jobs in business, government, and elsewhere.

In this spirit, I want to celebrate an unlikely hero of career readiness: the Chicago Manual of Style footnote. If you have a history degree, mastering this footnote is a (perhaps frustrating) rite of passage. It is also great career training.

To be sure, the vast majority of history alumni are not using Chicago Style footnotes in their current jobs. But that’s not the point. The footnote symbolizes a way of thinking that is deeply valuable in diverse jobs. Footnotes offer the best citation format for showing readers the nature of our sources. The APA and MLA formats foreground the author’s last name but little else. Their slick but skimpy parenthetical citations send readers hunting on a separate “works cited” page for deeper context. Was the author addressing Congress, or writing a private letter to a parent? This context matters, and only a footnote provides this key info on the same page. In short, footnotes train both authors and readers to scrutinize the context behind each source. Historians call this habit “sourcing,” and it prepares history majors for any profession that requires careful judgment about evidence, context, and credibility.

But few history majors learn to celebrate the footnote for this virtue. We historians need to become better advocates of our own intellectual training—to explain, especially in job interviews, how our historical training builds sourcing, analysis, skepticism, and other intellectual habits that drive successful careers.

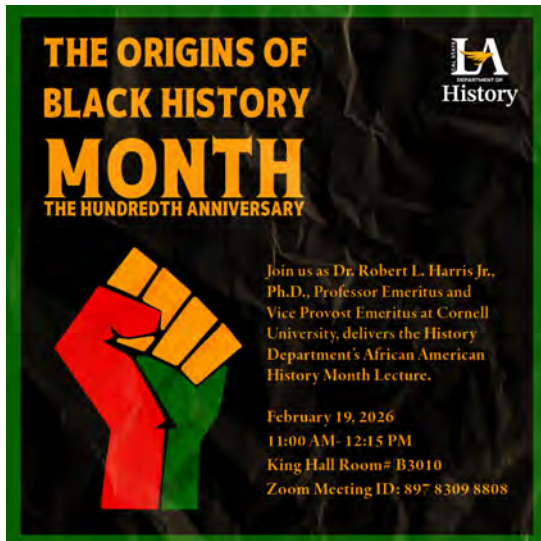

Dr. Vergara was named as one of two ASEH Fellows by the [American Society for Environmental History](#).



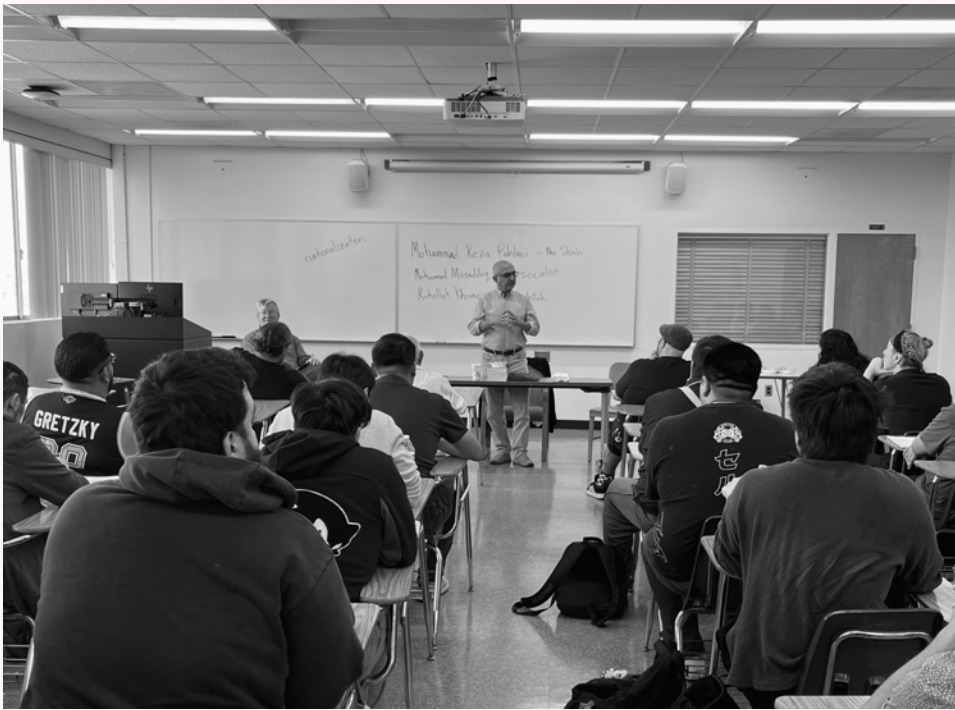
Dr. Carole Srole

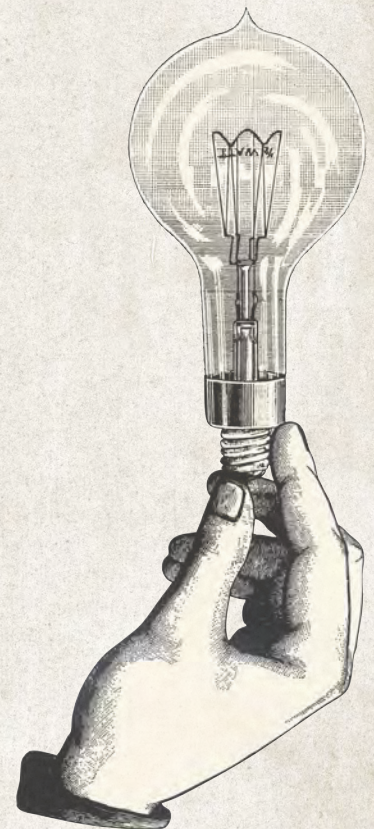

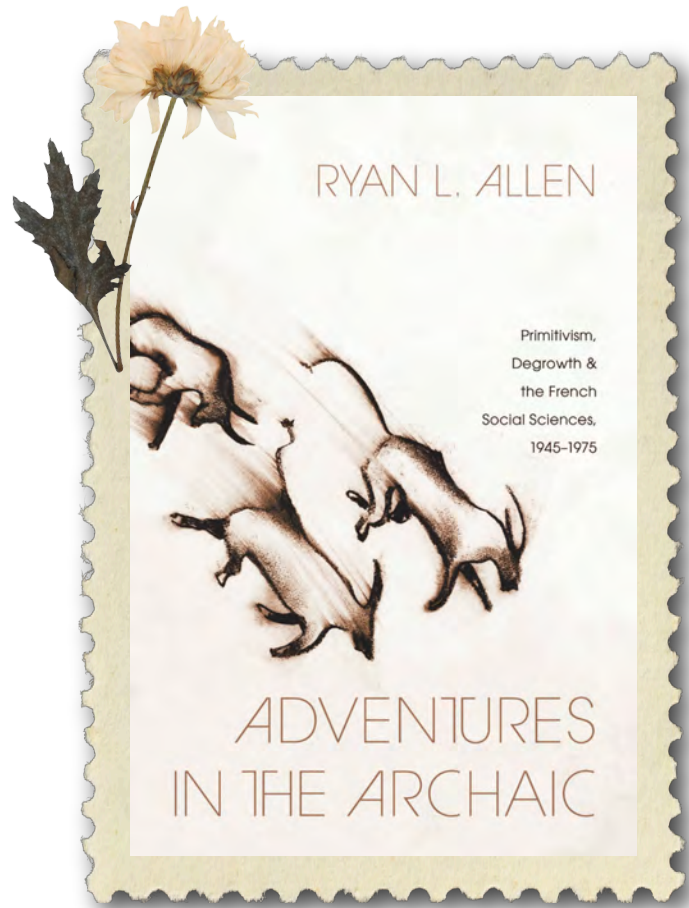

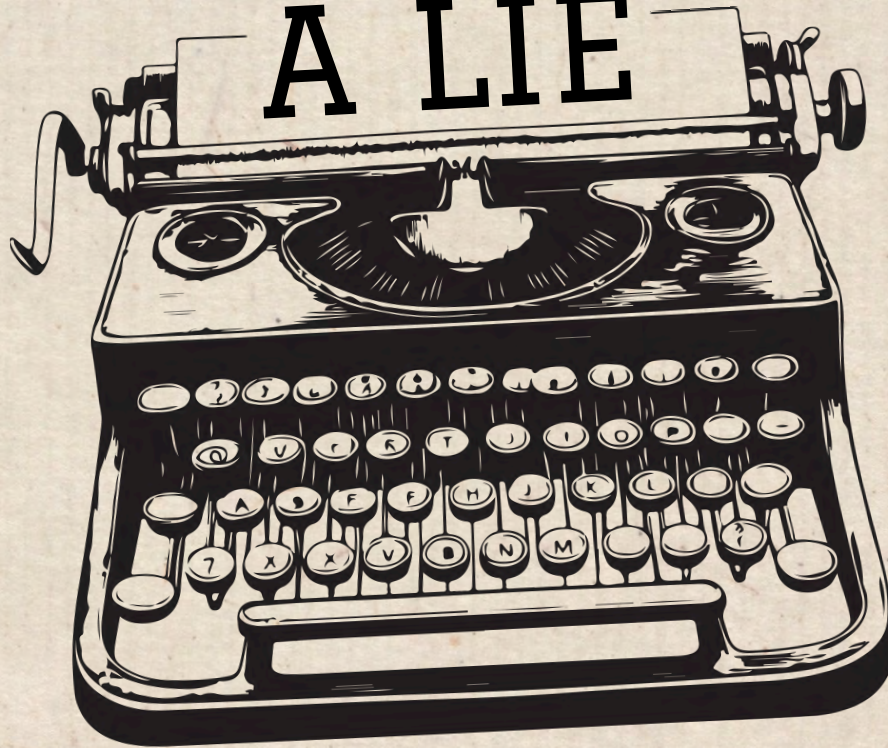

Mark Dodge taught generations of students at Cal State LA and Pasadena City College. He earned his MA in History at Cal State LA in the late 1970s. As a student, he also served as editor-in-chief of our journal, *Perspectives*. He later served as faculty advisor for the journal, making him the only person to lead *Perspectives* as both student and faculty.

Dr. Rodolfo "Rudy" Acuña (BA 1957; MA 1962) helped establish the field of Chicano Studies. With two degrees from our department, Acuña taught K-12 and then earned a PhD in History from USC. He became CSUN's first Chicano Studies professor in 1969 and wrote over 20 books, including a landmark textbook, *Occupied America*. He received a distinguished alumni award from our department in 2014.
