ECON 3030 + ECON 4150	Accounting	Banking, interest rates, forecasting, business conditions	ECON 4350 can replace ECON 3030 for a stronger Fed/market-indicators focus
ECON 4110 + ECON 4150	Entrepreneurship; Management; Marketing; Retailing	Competition, pricing, strategy, demand forecasting	ECON 3030 can replace ECON 4150 for students wanting a broader macro/financial background
ECON 4150 + ECON 4350	Finance; Real Estate	Forecasting, market indicators, Fed policy, interest-rate environment	ECON 3030 can replace ECON 4150 or ECON 4350 for a broader banking/money foundation
