This partition created current-day borders in Africa



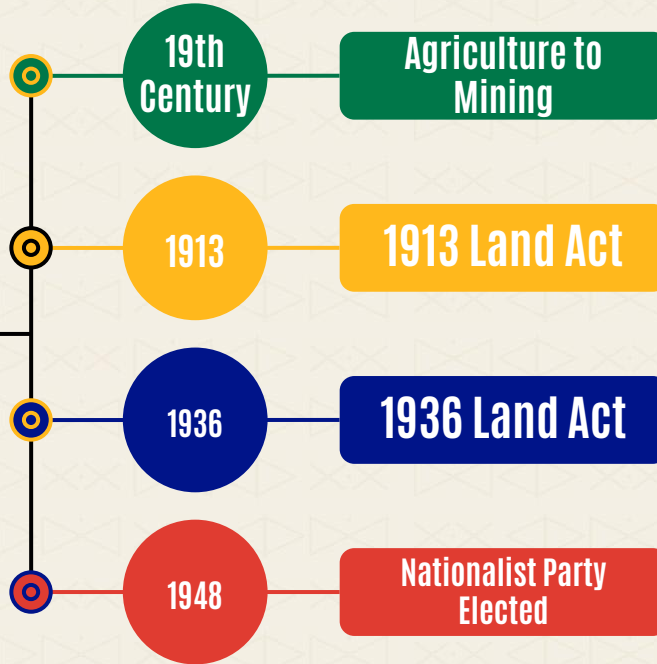
South Africa

Colonization to Apartheid Timeline



The Dutch & British focus on agricultural products until 1867, when diamonds were found in Kimberly and later when the world's largest gold deposit was found in Johannesburg

Less than 8% of the land would be allocated to 75% of the native population

Land allocation to native Blacks was extended and capped at 13.5% (which would from reserves)

Initiates a formal system of brutal racial segregation called apartheid

Nationalist Party: South African Nazism as Apartheid, 1948-1994

01

Outlawed mixed race/interracial marriages

02

Outlawed Jewish immigrants and immigration; removed right of college students to vote

03

Segregated those classified as Indians (from India) and Coloreds (those mixed with white and Black)

04

The complete segregation of native/indigenous Black South Africans to reserves and townships, which were the most under-resourced, impoverished communities

Early apartheid legislation removes limitations on state incursion through decrees and brutally violent state enforcement with absolute power because South Africa has no constitution.

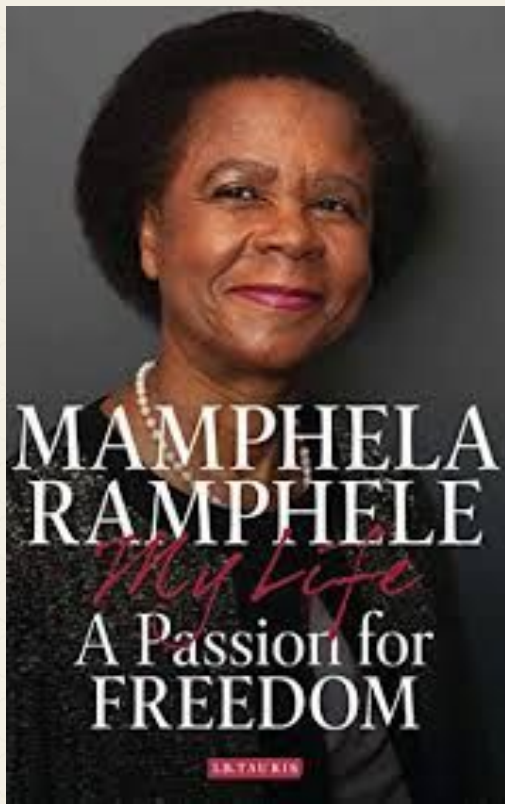

Bantu Education: The Reality of Separate and UNEQUAL


- During apartheid, the country spent 20X more on white children than on Black children
- A great divide in quality of education re: resources, class sizes, supplies, facilities exists between urban and rural education that was created during apartheid
- The Apartheid curriculum was Eurocentric, racist and based on colonization

★ The objective of Bantu Education was to indoctrinate the majority of South Africans (i.e. indigenous Black South Africans) to serve the very small minority of Boer (i.e. Dutch-descent), English, and other European-descent South Africans in slave-like conditions



First-Hand Account of Bantu Education

“Charles Dickens could well have set his bleaker social novels in South Africa and, specifically, in one of the most important secondary educational institutions in the then northern Transvaal...Like many of my contemporaries, I arrived with great expectations in January 1962 at what I anticipated would be a place of higher learning...First, the dormitories we are housed in are in an appalling state of disrepair. There are bedbugs everywhere...The second major problem area, probably the most important one for young growing bodies such as ours, is the quality of the food. I cannot understand how any responsible adult can expect young people to live on a diet that consists of mainly carbohydrates, occasional meat (often rotten), and little fresh fruits and vegetables...It is hardly surprising that the majority of the students, particularly the girls, end up with severe pellagra (a vitamin B complex deficiency). What is even more infuriating, though, is the attitude of the matron. She blames the skin manifestation of the vitamin deficiency disease on the girls themselves.”

Closing Activity: Developing Compassion through Comparison

The African child learns to hate his heritage in his days at school. So negative is the image of African society presented to him that he tends to find solace only in close identification with white society. Part of the approach in bringing about “black consciousness” has to be directed to the past, to seek to rewrite the history of the black man and to produce in it the heroes who form the core of the African background.
