Voices of L.A. About the Survey

- Total N=1,500 Latina/o's (Full survey of N=3,000)
- Margin of error +/- 2.5%
- Los Angeles county residents
- Field Dates: November 8 December 24, 2021
- English or Spanish, according to preference (61%/39%)
- > 70% online, 30% phone

Implemented by Matt Barreto & Anais López of BSP Research

Key Findings: Ongoing Worry and Economic Support

1. Impact of COVID-19

- For Latinos, the pandemic is not behind them; serious economic and health concerns remain
- > 47% of Los Angeles Latinos had hours cut or lost their job during the pandemic
- 50% of Latino households have \$500 or less saved up for emergencies

2. Discrimination and hate crimes

- 80% of Latinos note that anti-Latino racism is currently a serious problem,
- > 62% of Latinos believe there is "a lot" of discrimination against immigrants
- > 50% say they have personally experienced discrimination

Key Findings: Child vaccinations, plans, and barriers

3. Voting and civic engagement

- Despite limitations of COVID-19, Latinos report high levels of engagement in political and civic life
- Friends and family are top political influences for Latinos
- Latinos don't have full trust of any form of government, most common answer is trusting government "some of the time"
- Over 80% say it is important to have a Latina/o represent them in public office
- Talking to friends and family is the most common form of political engagement among Latinos
- Those who report discrimination are significantly more engaged



What would you say are the most important problems facing the Los Angeles area?





Clear majority of Latino adults vaccinated


Have you received a COVID-19 vaccine?


High rates of job/economic disruption and major class divide on ability to work from home during pandemic



Latinos believe pandemic relief remains necessary



Due to the pandemic, the state government provided rent relief, eviction protection, and stimulus checks. At this point, do you think these policies




Half of Latinos have \$500 or less for emergencies


About how much money do you currently have in savings or for emergencies?


Access to internet varied greatly by nativity



When asked which term they prefer to use in describing their ethnicity, Hispanic remains the top term used in Los Angeles


Which term do you prefer to describe your ethnicity?



Latinos believe anti-Latino racism is a serious problem


Combined 80% of Latinos note that anti-Latino racism is currently a serious problem

How much discrimination would you say there is in the US today against:



Please specify where have been treated unfairly or personally experienced discrimination because of your race or ethnicity:





Latinos engage news in both English & Spanish


When it comes to information about news and current affairs, do you primarily rely on English or Spanish sources?


Family & ethnicity influence Latino politics most

On a scale from 1 to 5, with 1 meaning no influence and 5 meaning most influential, how much would you say the following. influence politics in your life?





Friends and Family are key for political discourse

During the past two years have you had the opportunity to do any of the following things either in person or online? Have you ever:




Latinos lean Democrat, but they aren't necessarily liberal







Thinking in political terms, would you consider yourself to be liberal, moderate, or conservative?



Latinos do not have favorable views of Trump




Latinos in LA generally approve of Democrats




Latinos trust the government "some of the time"

Teachers and Healthcare remain the most trusted


How much of the time do you trust each of the following to be the responsive to your needs?

Continue to find a high degree of Latino shared commonality and group consciousness in Los Angeles


Even though we come from different countries, [Hispanic/Latino] people share many fundamental interests that unite us.




Latino representation matters
