

About the Survey

- Total N=3,000 (+/-1.8%) Los Angeles Residents
 - Antelope Valley, Long Beach, San Fernando Valley, San Gabriel Valley, SELA, South LA
- South Los Angeles
 - Random Sample N=500 (+/-4.4%)
 - Residents of South LA randomly selected so that each member has an equal chance of being chosen
 - Community Sourced N= 164
 - Participants selected by accessibility and represent the network of community-connected residents of South LA
- Focus is on pandemic recovery




About the Survey

- Mixed Mode: 75% online, 25% telephone




Roadmap to Understanding the Results & Comparisons

- South LA community sourced sample







South LA respondents were very likely to talk with friends/family about an issue involving government during the pandemic




Majorities of South LA respondents reported voting for several local public offices




Voter engagement efforts reached about half of South LA respondents in the 2022 election cycle




About half experienced cuts in work hours and struggled to make grocery and rent/mortgage payments during the pandemic




About half of South LA respondents fell behind at least 1 monthly payment (rent, mortgage, car, utility, etc.) since the pandemic began




An alarming amount reported having less than \$100 saved for emergencies




About 2 in 10 face food insecurity and about 2 in 10 face housing insecurity






About a third of respondents have relied on several organizations for access to essential needs




The financial situation of 1/4 of South LA respondents worsened since the pandemic began




1 in 6 respondents believe it will take them more than 3 years to recover economically




Half report having been affected by extreme weather (heat, wildfires, drought, etc.)




Slight majority reported suffering serious health and financial problems due to extreme weather




Vast majority have received at least 2 COVID vaccines




Majority reports regularly wearing their mask



About 4 in 10 reported testing positive for COVID




Doctors and healthcare professionals are the most trusted messengers for COVID guidance and recommendations




About half believe the worst of the pandemic is over but there is a need to address the issues created
