#### **Courses taught:**

I taught 22 different courses (way too many) at Cal State LA alone. Initially I was hired to teach public policy and quantitative methods; I proposed the addition of four new public policy courses and the same number of computer applications and methodology courses. At one point I think I did seven course proposals in one year to move the MS in Public Administration program entirely to the graduate level in response to accreditation demands. Later in my career, particularly after returning from Washington, D.C. in 1997, I taught mostly public policy courses focusing on aging, gerontology, and health policy.



Since retirement I have taught several courses at UCSB, including the introduction to American politics with over 300 students, voting and elections, the presidency, and public policy analysis.

# **Scholarly / Creative Activity:**

My research initially focused on the politics of federal grant distribution. Later I did articles on legislators and their constituencies, the politics of processing major public projects, international mediation, permanent part-time employment in California, and microsimulation. Most recently I focused on two books, one of which actually had six different editions out at once (it was a computer and statistics book) and a book I was the lead author and coordinator for on California politics.

# Personal commentary:

I had some great experiences in my career at Cal State LA. I was the department chair for seven years in a row at a time when we actually had resources, unlike now. I was able to go to Washington, D.C. and work for the federal government for two years when the Clinton administration worked on some really interesting health policy issues, some of which I was involved in.

Some of the more interesting – or strange – things I have been involved with:

- I was part of a group in 1997 in Washington that formulated the initial draft of the President's proposal that eventually became the State Children's Health Insurance Program.
- I corrected a sentence in one of President Clinton's State of the Union Addresses 1.5 hours before it was to be given in 1997. He read it flawlessly!
- I taught in New Zealand twice and never did figure out which way to look when crossing the street; were it not for friends, I might well not be here to write this.
- I taught American politics at the University of Canterbury in 1981 and did one lecture and two tutorials a week myself. There was a student signed up named Zaphod Beeblebrox, who never came to class. Fortunately, a friend from Great Britain told me at lunch at the end of the term that in fact Zaphod Beeblebrox is the emperor of the universe (who has two heads and three arms!) in Doug Adams' book, *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy*, something I should have known since Adams lived in Montecito about 15 miles from my home! [I announced the last day that Zaphod had received the only "A" grade in tutorial that term.]

- One of my favorite stories was teaching next to a dead cat in KH LH #1 in 1994; I sent the grader out to ask for Plant Operations to come remove it, and she was told that "the university has no one on campus authorized to remove a dead animal." The cat was there for almost 36 hours, covered up the second day by a little rug that allowed its tail to stick out!
- I caught a student plagiarizing once from three issues of *Penthouse* you can ask where I came up with a copy to prove the plagiarism!
- I had twenty grants in my career, including four from the National Science Foundation.

My department was extremely supportive when I came to the university, and it had resources to be supportive *with*, which made all the difference. All in all, it was a great run.
