Chair Bettcher convened the (Zoom) meeting at 1:48 p.m.

Senator Ramos read the Tongva land acknowledgement.

- 1. 1.1 Chair's announcements:
 - There will be one Senator-at-large seat that will become vacant at the end of 1.1.1 Spring 2022. The petition period for additional nominations ends today. The University-wide election will be held April 13 - 19.
 - 1.1.2 Next Tuesday, Choi Chatterjee will be presenting lecture two of the President's Distinguished Professors. The deadline to RSVP to attend in person is Thursday, April 14. For those who cannot attend in person but wish to view it, the lecture will be live streamed and the link can be accessed from the Cal State LA Events webpage.
 - 1.2 Senator Rodriguez announced: You're invited to the Faculty Author Researcher Recognition reception which will be held Tuesday, April 26 at 4:00 p.m. We are cohosting this with the Office of Research, Scholarship and Creative Activities and we will be recognizing our faculty authors who have received research grants in the past year. All faculty are invited and an invitation will be going out this afternoon.

3. 3.1 Senator Riggio announced her intent to raise the following question: Current 2nd-year graduate students were severely impacted by the pandemic. Institutional policies kept first-year M.S. students off campus for the majority of the 2020-2021 academic year, delaying the start of mentored research. Many M.S. students will need to delay their planned graduation from Spring '22 into summer. Current policy requires students to pay \$325 to register for UNIV 9000 plus \$25 to update their graduation term. Congress gave our University over \$129 million in institutional funding through HEERF I, II and III to offset costs of the pandemic.

> Can the \$350 fee be waived for graduate students who need to extend their graduation term into summer term, given the socioeconomic challenges our students face and how prolonged campus closure disadvantaged this cohort?

3.2 Chair Bettcher shared the following response from Amy Bippus, Vice Provost of Academic Affairs, to Senator Ramos' intent to raise questions from the meeting of March 1, 2022 (ASM 21-11):

The data below from the Chancellor's Office shows that, during this time period, lecturers represented 3% of the overall applicant pool for tenure track positions at Cal State LA but were made offers in 20% of the searches.
