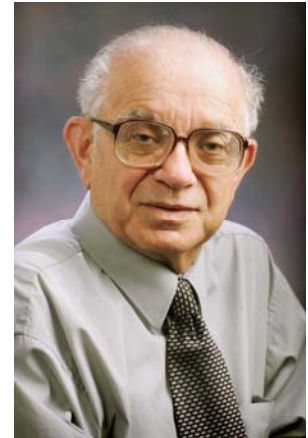

Scholarly/Creative Activity:

- I was trained as a historian of ancient Greece, but relatively little of my scholarly activity has concerned the history of Greece proper. Instead, my scholarship has focused on the relations of Greeks with non-Greeks in other parts of the ancient world, first in the Black Sea, then in Egypt and Northeast Africa, and most recently in Central Asia. During the last decade and a half of my career at CSULA I also became involved in Social Studies education, writing a number of articles on the teaching of history and serving as one of the two lead authors of a middle school world history program that was adopted by over 100 California school districts.

Personal commentary, including non-academic interests and accomplishments:

- When my FERP finished in 2010 I could look back on a rewarding forty-two year career in the History Department at CSULA that was highlighted by two successful terms as department chair and outstanding professor, President's distinguished professor, and Wang awards. My career didn't start out well though.
- The department hired me as ABD in 1968 over the administration's objection that it already had too many UCLA graduates, and I promptly rewarded it by telling my chair—Dick Burns--at the end of my first year that I had to start a new Ph.D. topic. I finished my Ph.D. in early 1972, barely one month before I was to be terminated. The rest of the 1970s were also hard. The department was overstaffed, and I had to teach US history to keep a full load, while my wife was trying to complete her school psychologist credential and raise our two daughters. Standing in line to register her for classes at the "temporary buildings" behind the stadium is still a vivid memory.
- The 1980s and 1990s, however, were good years. My wife's career in the Baldwin Park School District flourished and so did mine at CSULA. I knew from the beginning that I enjoyed teaching, but I also discovered I loved scholarship, and seventeen books and almost a hundred articles later I still do. In addition I found a whole new area of university and community service that I enjoyed almost as much. I had always been interested in curriculum; the Ancients & Moderns theme, which I designed, is the only surviving theme from the original upper division GE program. Service on the Teacher Education Subcommittee and the Political Science department's decision to give up administering the Social Science credential program, however, opened the possibility of

working on teacher education. As Social Science coordinator I designed and administered the department's credential programs while simultaneously serving on various state and national curriculum and teaching committees. Work on these committees wasn't always smooth—the National History Standards, which I helped develop, were denounced by the US Senate by a vote of 99 to 1—but it has been enormously satisfying.

- When I was hired in 1968, my expectation was that CSULA would only be my first job. It hasn't turned out that way; and looking back, I can honestly say that that I am glad it didn't.
