I will be graduating this summer from California State University Los Angeles with a degree in finance, and I am very interested in pursuing a position with your firm in financial advisory. My coursework includes securities analysis, investments, fixed income, and derivatives. I was treasurer of the Cal State LA Financial Management Association, have been actively involved in managing the student fund, and was a member of this year's team sent to represent the university at the CFA Research Challenge. I have also taken additional courses in acting and writing; I have excellent people skills and can write well. I look forward to discussing career opportunities at Brown & Company with you.
