## After completing the BA in Anthropology, students should be able to:

- 1. Describe past and present human societies, human evolution and biological variation and relation to non-human primates, and linguistic and cultural diversity synchronically and diachronically.
- 2. Explain the social, cultural, linguistic, biological, and environmental factors and contexts that affect human diversity through time.
- 3. Apply current anthropological theories and methodologies to the study of humanity and non-human primates across time and space.
- 4. Apply appropriate methodologies to collect and assess anthropological data.
- 5. Describe the ethical responsibilities of anthropologists, particularly when engaging with human and non-human primate populations and when working with human and non-human primate skeletal remains and cultural belongings from the past and present and apply ethical research principles in anthropology.
- 6. Communicate about basic concepts in anthropology orally and in writing.
- 7. Apply anthropological concepts to address concerns such as social inequality, indigenous knowledge/language, health, economic, and educational disparities, violence, migration/refugees, and climate change.
