Again, Fred uses this opportunity to emphasize the skills that will be of importance to his potential employer, as well as listing the critical subjects of Advance Corporate Finance, Capital Budgeting, and Securities Analysis, in terms his potential employer will understand.

Final notes

- 1. Many recommend that an objective be listed at the top of a resume. I feel it duplicates the cover letter, and potentially limits your appeal for other positions. The recipient may see promise in other areas that you hadn't thought of, or it may get passed to management in other departments. A strong objective may deter them from approaching you. If you list one, target it to that firm/position, as you should target your resume, and keep it broad: e.g. "Seeking a challenging position in corporate finance with substantial career growth potential."
- 2. If you have little work experience, don't be shy about listing the experience you have. But, realize that much of it should drop away once you have career relevant or professional experience. (I worked as a groundsman for a school district when I was getting my bachelor's. That all but disappeared from my resume after my three month paid internship with Northrop, and was completely removed with my next position.)
