Alumni Profile: Stefan Ogbac (B.A. 2011, M.A. 2014)



So what are you doing these days?

I've been an associate online editor at Motor Trend for over five years now and my work has evolved so many times already. Originally I was hired to research and update the website's buying guide pages and write new vehicle reviews. For the last two years I've been responsible for covering Hyundai Motor Group (Hyundai, Kia, and Genesis), and the small Japanese automakers (Mazda and

Subaru). As a result, I also wear the reporter hat these days because of my contributions to the daily news output and interviewing key automotive executives. The latter is one of the most fulfilling parts of job because it allows me to get the inside scoop on future products and the direction an automaker is headed.

Outside of work, you'll find me up on the mountains (usually Angeles Crest Highway) on a relaxing drive, going to car meets looking for that one oddball/unique vehicle that's highly significant to the auto industry, or in the kitchen cooking up Filipino food you can't find in Filipino restaurants in the U.S.

I didn't know history graduates went into journalism! How are you using what you learned in history at Motor Trend?

I didn't either! That is until I realized all of the research and writing I've been doing during my undergraduate and graduate programs are easily applicable to the work journalists do. Since future products are one of my main interests, good research skills have come in handy in creating compelling stories and finding out what automakers don't want you to know. All of the writing I did during my time in the program helped especially when reviewing subpar vehicles, because I can get my criticisms across without sounding overly negative. The public history class I took was crucial since it forced me to interview people, something I've been doing for the last three years now in my profession.

Favorite memory of the program?

Taking Professor Chatterjee's classes three quarters in a row. I came to Cal State LA to learn and she was one of the professors that would push you to take one topic from a previous class and expand on it in two other researchfocused seminars. I did the same thing again in my graduate program with Professor Chatterjee and Professor Yao twice in a row each. That's on top of taking Professor Wild a few times and Professor Endy, too. Yes, I got pushed hard but I came out of it a flexible writer who can handle even the most unfamiliar topics.
