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Introduction

Welcome to the thirty-fourth edition of *Perspectives: A Journal of Historical Inquiry*, the CSULA History Department's peer-reviewed journal. Under the able advisement of Dr. Birte Pfleger, and in conjunction with the Eta Xi chapter of Phi Alpha Theta History Honor Society, this journal was written, arranged, and edited entirely by students. Since its inception in 1973, *Perspectives* has provided our academic community with a discursive forum that has been both accessible and rigorous, as the following articles will confirm.

John C. Chen opens by discussing the complex relationship between Protestant Christianity and its Chinese converts in the early twentieth century. Next, Mark Steckler examines the motivation behind the criminal charge of homosexuality that Philip IV of France brought against the Knights Templar. In the third article, Laura Kaiser Paré describes how West German women adapted to increasing American influences in the postwar period. Efrain Diaz illuminates how early twentieth-century Americans unwittingly helped support the fledgling Soviet government. Finally, David Jamison analyzes how competition for funding affected early trends in the field of African Studies in the U.S.

As the product of an upper-division history course in journal editing, Volume thirty-fourth's development was driven by the intense collaboration of a diverse and creative group of students. These ideal conditions engendered three significant innovations: the inclusion of book reviews, advertisements, and the premiere of our online edition. Distinguished by these new features, and guided by a tradition of historical inquiry, the editors are confident in this volume's scholarly relevance to the CSULA community and beyond.
