- In 1963 the CSULA Brass Choir was selected by the USO to entertain troops in Guam, Okinawa, Japan and Korea for 8 weeks. This included two women and 13 men (a variety show).

Personal commentary:

I taught on the old Vermont Avenue campus from 1950 to 1956. Then we moved to temporary buildings on the present campus. The Vermont buildings consisted of Quonset huts with no air conditioning, but now I feel the students did excel and they were some of the finest I ever had. They were eager to learn and become outstanding teachers. Some later became professors at universities and music supervisors of school districts.

We were on the semester system, and students had more time for maturation of knowledge and skills. Before we heard that in 1967 we were going on the quarter system, I studied the time in class and the credit for professors. We were informed that the three unit semester class would be 4.5 units on the quarter system. Most 3 unit semester classes would become 4 units on the quarter system. This means that the professor was teaching 12 semester units per semester or 24 per year, 8 classes total.

Now, in the quarter system, professors would teach 12 quarter units or 3 classes per quarter, which would be 36 quarter system units per year or 9 classes, with no extra pay. In addition, classes that were 1 and 2 unit semester classes would become 1 and 2 quarter units.

Also students and professors were short changed. There were 6 week summer sessions on the semester system and professors would receive extra pay. It appeared to me that the semester system was superior for the students and for the professors. I wrote an article entitled "The Quarter Quandary," which was published in the Pasadena Star-News.

These are some of my experiences teaching at CSULA for 33 years.
