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Ten-Year Extension of Charter Status

ollowing the completion of a highly successful five-year pilot phase, the CSU Office of the Chancellor has recently granted to the **Charter College of Education** a ten-year extension of its charter status.

The assessment of the effectiveness of the University's Charter College of Education, conducted by The Evaluation Center at Western Michigan University, confirms the success of the College's "initial aspiration of engaging in creative experimentation and the development, implementation, and evaluation of new models of teaching and learning that incorporate best practice and research-based knowledge."

The external evaluation report also mentions several noteworthy accomplishments including "an extremely high level of faculty and staff enthusiasm for the directions and the way the Charter College of Education is operating" and the success of the College as a Whole (CAW) as a shared form of university governance.

Committed to leading educators to transform public schools, the College of-

fers a coordinated, multidisciplinary approach to the education of children and youth. Collaborating within the College and with public schools in the urban Los Angeles area, the faculty prepares professionals to become learner-advocates who show competence in subject matter and professional knowledge and skills and who are dedicated to improving the educational environment of all children and youth.

Since 1993, the College has operated as the first and only Charter College of Education in the nation. It is one of the largest educators of teachers in California. Because the campus is located in the heart of metropolitan Los Angeles, the College programs reflect concern with the problems and challenges of urban education with particular emphasis on linguistic and cultural diversity.

The Charter College of Education has been continuously accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education and recently became the first institution in California to have been granted full accreditation by the California Committee on Accreditation.

fter an intense week-long simulated United Nations conference, Cal State L.A.'s Model U.N. chapter brought home a big souvenir from the Big Apple—its first national award since the club's inception more than 30 years ago.

The Cal State L.A. team, led by faculty advisers **Donald Bray** and **Marjorie Bray** (*Latin American Studies*), placed in the top 30 schools among 190 universities in the United States. The best teams were ranked in three categories: outstanding delegation, distinguished delegation and honorable mention. Cal State L.A. students earned the honorable mention distinction.

Representing the Republic of Italy, the delegation of 32 Cal State L.A. students were divided into 16 committees of two-member teams, each having to research policies and issues for their respective committees as well as general facts regarding Italy.

Service Learning Grant

al State L.A. was one of six CSU campuses recently awarded a twoyear grant from the **Getty Grant Program** to support service learning programs in which students learn from community service experiences directly tied to the academic content of their courses.

The Getty grant, "Linking Service Learning and the Visual Arts," will partner Cal State L.A. faculty and community agencies to develop an array of service learning courses in the visual arts. The courses will offer Cal State L.A. students opportunities to learn more about museums and other visual arts organizations to foster a better understanding of, and increased commitment to, the nonprofit arts sector.

The \$167,000 grant will fund a service-learning institute for faculty and deans at Cal State L.A. and five other CSU campuses — Dominguez Hills, Fullerton, Long Beach, Northridge, and Pomona. Selected faculty will then receive stipends to work with local arts organizations to develop new service-learning courses. In the future, the CSU hopes to expand this program to all of its campuses.
