

Online Music Librarianship Course



ave you ever wondered what online courses Cal State L.A. offers? **Greg Engstrom** (*Music*) and Faculty Instructional Technology Support Center (FITSC) Lab manager **Nancy Weckwerth** teach an online-only course, *Introduction to Music Librarianship*, using WebCT, the campus online course delivery software.

On July 21, 1999, the course was featured in an online presentation, prepared by Weckwerth, at the International Association of Music Librarians conference in New Zealand. At the end of the presentation, New Zealand attendees logged onto the course via the Internet. Entering the WebCT Chat Room, the participants were brought together with course instructors in the University's FITSC Lab for a live real-time discussion, in which the instructors were able to answer participants' questions across the miles. Several Cal State L.A. faculty and staff members observed the live interaction in the lab.

E&T Building Construction Update

The first phase of the three-phase \$31 million Engineering and Technology Laboratory Renovation Project



is complete with the reopening of the E&T building C-wing, which houses most of the engineering laboratories.

Almost all laboratories in the Cwing are operational and the School is in the process of reviewing equipment lists and preparing purchase orders for the \$4.4 million earmarked for equipment to fill these laboratories.

In addition, the School of Engineering and Technology has embarked on a major fundraising campaign for in-kind donations of equipment and/or donations of cash to purchase equipment.

Recently, **Hewlett-Packard Company** made a large donation of stateof-the-art testing and instrumentation equipment, valued at \$198,300, to equip two electrical engineering labs. The second and third phases of the renovation project are underway, with projected completion in Spring 2000.

Laboratories in the C-wing include the following:

Ground level: Aerodynamics Laboratory (CE/ME); two Research Laboratories (one of which is currently housing the Fiber Optics and Non-Linear Optics Lab); Soils, Pavement and Asphalt Design Laboratory (CE); and Advanced Strength of Materials Laboratory (CE/ME).

First floor: Data Acquisition/ Machine Analysis Lab (ME), Controls Lab (EE/ME), Surveying Lab (CE), Thermal Systems Lab (ME/TECH), Metallurgy Lab (ME), Photo Elasticity Lab (ME), Strength of Materials Lab (CE/ME), Concrete Lab (CE), and Environmental Lab (CE).

Second floor: Computer Suite, which includes Engineering and Technology Open Access Lab (43 workstations), three Computer Classrooms (25 workstations), Design Laboratory (20 workstations), and Advanced Workstation Laboratory (12 workstations); Digital Design Lab (EE); Interface Design Lab (EE); Measurements and Circuits Lab (EE); and Electronics Design Lab (EE).
