n Tuesday, May 19, balloons, banners, food, music and theater performances, receptions, talks, tours, and displays will be part of the campus "party" called FESTIVAL 50, as the University dedicates a day of events to its 50th anniversary.

The celebration will be an open house for the entire campus community and hundreds of area high school students, with the majority of events presented from 12 noon to 2 p.m.

Students, staff and faculty will be able to enjoy festivities that include continuous shows of student animation videos, short theater pieces, ongoing demonstrations of the fiery Japanese ceramic process called *raku*, incisive forensic team debates, a roundtable discussion on "the meaning of meaning" organized by the English and Philosophy departments, costume exhibits, folklorico dancing and performances by the Anderson

Quartet—the popular string quartet in residence at Cal State L.A.

If you're a major, a minor or just plain curious, the new biotech labs and numerous other laboratories will be open to visitors. Professors will do a chemistry magic show, demonstrate the Van de Graaff accelerator and conduct hands-on physics experiments, show how an electron microscope works, explain anthropology artifacts, and guide visitors through the Geology Department's "mineral museum." Visitors to the Geography labs can generate a map using state-of-the-art GIS software, participate in wave dynamics or beach erosion experiments, or take air pollution samples.

Several 50th anniversary exhibits will be open for viewing, including 50 Years of Faculty Scholarship & Creativity, an Emeriti exhibit, Library bridge; Young at Art, artwork by the children of the Anna Bing Arnold

aren Johnson (Physical Education), associate dean of the School of Health and Human Services, was one of only four individuals presented with the Verne Landreth Award, the highest honor bestowed by the California Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (CAHPERD) at its 65th Annual state conference, March 6, in San Diego, California.

Johnson has a bachelor's degree in physical education from the College of Idaho, a master's degree in physical education administration from Cal State L.A., and a doctoral degree in physical education with an emphasis on motor learning from USC.

Johnson arrived at Cal State L.A. in 1965 as an assistant professor of physical

education. In 1982, she achieved a full professorship in the Department of



Physical Education and, in 1990, was named associate dean of the School of Health and Human Services. Since 1992, she has been coordinator of "On Course," the computer-based advisement system at the University. In 1996, she served as director of the Title III

Strengthening Institutions grant for Cal State L.A.

Johnson has coached basketball and volleyball and has been very prolific in her published work and presentations in the field of physical education. Her support and drive in the field of girls' and women's sports have been a major commitment in her life.

Johnson has received many awards including the Frier Award, Member Relations Award, and Leader in Volleyball Award from the U.S. Volleyball Association; the Pathfinder Award, Honor Fellow Award, and Presidential Citation from NAGWS, and the Honor Award from both CAHPERD and the American Association forHealth, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.
