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Professor Receives Art Educator of the Year Award

arol S. Jeffers (*Art*) was selected by the National Art Education Association (NAEA) to receive the Pacific Region Higher Education Art Educator of the



Year Award. This annual award recognizes an NAEA member for exemplary contribution, service and achievement

within each NAEA division. The award was presented at the Association's national convention in Washington, DC, March 24-28, 1999.

Jeffers, who joined the Cal State L.A. art faculty in 1993, holds a Ph.D. from the University of Maryland at College Park. She is an expert in preservice teacher education, multicultural art education and curriculum theory, and is currently the director of Cal State L.A.'s collaborative Art Education Program at El Sereno Youth Center. Jeffers has also been directing a Cal State L.A. art education program, Project CLASP (Community Leadership for Art and School Partnerships), at the Armory Center for the Arts in Pasadena. The project involves

students and teachers of the Pasadena Unified School District.

According to NAEA president Michael Day, the award "recognizes a high level of professional accomplishment and service by a dedicated art educator. Jeffers exemplifies the high quality of individuals involved in the field of art education today: leaders, teachers, students, scholars and advocates who give their very best to the profession."

NAEA's membership includes elementary, middle level and high school art educators in 50 states, and representatives from major art museums, state departments of education, art councils, and major colleges and universities throughout the United States and 66 foreign countries.
