Cal State L.A. on Electric Powerbikes

arking control and campus police officers now have an alternative mode of transportation and one that is definitely cost-efficient and smog-free. Three new electric powerbikes from ZAP Power Systems, valued at \$2,000 each, were donated to the Cal State L.A. Department of Public Safety by the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) on September 9, 1998. One of the bikes will be used for law enforcement and the other two will be used for parking patrol.

According to Sergeant Manuel Guerrero, parking control, the replacement of motor vehicles with electric powerbikes will help reduce air pollution, improve mobility, provide ease of accessibility, reduce operation costs and enhance campus community interaction. Guerrero was responsible for securing the donation from LADWP.

Each of the 20.5" ZAP blue electric

powerbikes has front-wheel suspension, 24-speed index-shifting, front and rear V-brakes, heavy duty Continental Goliath tires, rear rack, battery bag, and a cyclometer. In addition, the police powerbike is equipped with a siren.
