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David Yanai is Outstanding Coach

ong respected as one of the premier educators in Division II collegiate basketball, Cal State L.A. head coach **Dave Yanai** recently received recognition as an



outstanding coach at the John R. Wooden Awards Ceremony held at the Los Angeles Athletic Club. The 20-year old award is given annually to an individual who exemplifies the outstanding qualities set by the legendary coach.

"Coach Yanai is well-deserving of this award," said Sam Lagana, executive director of the L.A. Athletic Club." He was the unanimous choice of the selection committee. We also tried to make it a very special evening for him-to touch his heart-

and I believe we were successful."

The fourth-year Golden Eagle head coach guided his 1999-2000 squad to the NCAA Tournament (the second time in his Cal State L.A. tenure) and finished with a 19-9 overall record, the most wins for a men's basketball team since 1958-59 season.

Currently, Yanai ranks 28th among Division II's coaches with 355 victories. In 1997-98, he guided the Golden Eagles to the NCAA Tournament, losing in the regional semifinals to eventual national champion UC Davis, 53-51 on the Aggies' home court. Yanai also earned 1987 NCAA West Region Coach of the Year accolades and is a two-time CCAA Coach of the Year honoree.

As the first Japanese-American head coach at any level nationally, Yanai has also collected several other basketball distinctions in his career. He was selected as an assistant coach for the 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival West Team and is currently an advisor and consultant for the Japan National Team.

New Dean of Continuing Education

Graduate Fellow. He completed post-graduate work at Harvard University's Institute for the Management of Lifelong Education and at Vanderbilt Institute on Judaism. He has conducted research at Banaras Hindu University in Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh, India, and Madras University, in Madras, India.

Samuel E. Landsberger was recently appointed as Northrop Grumman Engineering Endowed Chair in Design



and Manufacturing for the School of Engineering and Technology. His work has focused on the design of medical and assistive devices for people with disabilities.

For the past five years, he has served as technical director of rehabilitation engineering research for Rancho Los Amigos Medical Center and as adjunct associate professor of biomedical engineering at USC.

Landsberger received his B.S. in mathematics from University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and his Sc.D. and S.M. in mechanical engineering from MIT.

He directs the HERE (Hands-on Experiences in Rehabilitation Engineering) collaborative projects between Cal State L.A. and Rancho Los Amigos. Projects were presented on Fri., June 2, in the Alhambra Room, U-SU, and included hockey and Sand Cruiser wheelchairs.

The Northrop Grumman Endowed Chair was established in 1996 in large part through a \$200,000 challenge grant from the Northrop Grumman Corporation—a leading designer, systems integrator, and manufacturer in defense and commercial aerospace. The challenge grant was recently completed through funding from manufacturing companies throughout Southern California. Class of 2000 Graduation Ceremony

The 53nd Commencement exercises at Cal State L.A. will take place on Sat., June 10, 2000, in the University Athletic Stadium, located at the southeast corner of the campus. The colorful academic procession will start at 8:15 a.m. and the formal exercises are scheduled to end at approximately 10 a.m. This year's Commencement speaker will be J. Paul Getty Trust President and CEO Barry Munitz, who served as CSU chancellor from 1991 to 1998.

Department and program receptions in various campus locations will follow the ceremony. More than 20,000 people are expected at this year's Commencement to witness the conferral of more than 1,082 master's degrees and 3,357 bachelor's degrees.

Among the students receiving degrees are: 4.0 student Glenda Giron, outstanding volunteer for children's rights and the environment; Jason Timmons, recipient of the 1999 Multicultural Motion Picture Association Educational and Development Scholarship; Cristal Gama, recipient of Caltech graduate fellowship in biochemistry; Brett Nagatani, this year's Phi Kappa Phi honoree; and 18-year-old biology major Zhong Tan, the youngest undergraduate in the Class of 2000.

Another 18-year old, Cal State L.A. alumnus **Mark Gordon**, will be the University's youngest graduate degree recipient. Seventy-two-year-old Liberal Studies ma-

jor **Xuan Guo** is Cal State L.A.'s "senior" undergraduate, receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Barry Munitz, president/CEO, The J. Paul Getty Trust

Dr. Barry Munitz assumed the post of president and chief executive officer of The J. Paul Getty Trust on January 6, 1998. For seven years prior to that he served as chancellor of the California State University, the largest system of senior higher education in the United States.

Born and raised in Brooklyn, New York, Munitz received a bachelor's

degree in classics and comparative literature from Brooklyn College, and master's degree and Ph.D. from Princeton University.

He began his academic career in 1966 at UC Berkeley, where he taught drama and literature for three years. From 1968 to 1970 he served under former University of California president Clark Kerr at the Carnegie Foundation Commission on Higher Education. In 1970, he accepted a po-



sition at the University of Illinois, where he served for six years as associate provost and, later, academic vice president for the University of Illinois system.

He became vice president and dean of faculties at the University of Houston-Central Campus in 1976 and was named chancellor in 1977. Entering the business sector in 1982, he became a senior executive at MAXXAM, Inc. in Houston, and remained at the company until he joined the California State University system in 1991.

In addition to his professional affiliations, he has been a national leader in promoting educational excellence at all levels. Since 1992, he has served on numerous public and private boards. He was chair of the American Council on Education, the leading higher education group in America, and chair of the California Education Round Table. He also served on the Commission on National Investment in Higher Education, the White House Commission "America Reads." He has served on the board of directors of SunAmerica, and is a director of SallieMae and Kaufman & Broad.

Currently, Dr. Munitz is on leave from his CSU Trustee Professorship as a tenured faculty member in Cal State L.A.'s Department of English.
