52nd Commencement Ceremony

ongresswoman Maxine Waters, a Cal State L.A. alumna, will be the keynote speaker for the **52nd Commencement** exercises at Cal State L.A. on June 12.

More than 20,000 people are expected at this year's graduation to witness the conferral of more than 1,000 master's degrees and 3,100 bachelor's degrees.

Congresswoman Waters, who earned her B.A. in sociology from Cal State L.A. in 1971, is considered by many to be among the most prominent women in American politics today. She has gained a reputation as a fearless and outspoken advocate for women, children, people of color, and poor people.

On a whole range of issues, economic development and police brutality, veterans' concerns, and international affairs, Waters can be found on the cutting edge. She has used her skill to win approval and funding for a number of important initiatives.

In December of 1996, Waters was chosen by her colleagues to chair the Congressional Black Caucus for the 105th Congressional term. This honor has placed her in the forefront of the political leadership of this country.

Prior to her election to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1990, Congress-



woman Waters already had attracted national attention for her no-nonsense, no-holds-barred style of politics. During 14 years in the California State Assembly, she rose to the powerful position of Democratic Caucus chair.

She also created the nation's first statewide Child Abuse Prevention Training Program, gained passage of a law to prohibit police strip searches for nonviolent misdemeanors, and promoted legislation to prevent toxic chemical catastrophes.

Waters is serving her fourth term in the House of Representatives serving the 35th District of California.

Gift from Parsons Foundation

Support brings campus closer to realizing project that explores American identity

Parsons Foundation has awarded \$100,000 to Cal State L.A. for a new initiative in the School of Arts and Letters. The American Community Program, scheduled to begin fall 1999, will examine how diverse cultures have contributed in unique ways to an American identity and how that identity is being further defined by new immigrant populations.

The full range of humanities disciplines at Cal State L.A— history, philosophy, literary studies, arts criticism, and cultural studies—will be used to explore how this American identity is embodied in

American cultural expressions.

"We have always been a gateway institution for new populations seeking to become part of mainstream American society," said Dean Carl Selkin (Arts and Letters). "The Parsons Foundation support is a key step in our development of this program, which will link the diverse experiences of our students with the intellectual dimensions of university study. The gift has been added to an endowment that will fund student and faculty research, public events, visiting professors, research materials and publications. Cal State L.A.

has committed funding for an endowed chair to organize and direct the program."

An ambitious campaign to raise \$1.35 million for the American Community Program was given its initial encouragement from the **National Endowment for the Humanities** (NEH). In 1996, the NEH presented a multi-year \$337,500 challenge grant to Cal State L.A.—one of 10 institutions nationally, and among only four in California, to receive the award. The NEH grant requires the University to raise three dollars for every one dollar provided by the NEH. Prominent contributors to the campaign have included the Ahmanson Foundation (\$100,000) and Edison International (\$15,000).

"In order to meet this year's NEH challenge deadline, the School of Arts and Letters has a goal of \$235,000 by July 31," explains Selkin.
