

#### **Sharing Your Culture With Others**

Cal State L.A.'s InterCultural Proficiency (ICP) project invites members of the University community to open their homes to students enrolled in the Credit Certificate Program in Intercultural Proficiency as a "host family"—a memorable and rewarding experience for families and the students they host.

The ICP project prepares students majoring in areas from nursing and social work to political science and education to become more culturally competent as they serve and interact with individuals and families who come from different cultures. The 24-unit certificate ICP program also includes seminars and field assignments in addition to the home-stay segment.

The idea of a host family experience evolved from personal experiences of professionals who were foreign exchange students or missionaries after graduating from high school or college. These professionals reported that the in-depth experience with a family of another culture changed them profoundly, and enabled them to interact more effectively with people of different cultures throughout their adult lives. The ICP program recognized that, given the very diverse cultural groups in Los Angeles, a similar experience could be enacted here.

Host families may either elect to invite a student to live with them in their home or spend time with them during weekdays or weekends. The student can share family meals, including preparation and cleanup; assist with housekeeping chores; join in shopping trips; entertain the children; and participate in family events. "The objective is for the student to really get to know the family and for the family to accept the student as a member of the family," says **Ruth Wu**, project coordinator.

The program covers two to three quarters; informal visits during the first two quarters help student and family get acquainted. During the third quarter, the student can attend a family's place of worship and participates in special cultural events and holidays with the host's family and friends, visits the host's workplace, or can spend time with the host during leisure hours. Wu notes that hosts are asked to treat the student as a family member who shares responsibilities and follows the rules of the house, not as a guest with special privileges.

## IN MEMORIAM

Norman Friedman

**Norman Friedman**, professor of Sociology and graduate adviser, passed away at home in November 1998 of cardiac arrest.

Friedman earned his B.S., M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Missouri, Columbia. On the Cal State L.A. faculty since 1968, he also served as department chair and associate chair for the Sociology Department.

Friedman published four books, numerous media reviews and 47 articles related to his areas of expertise, and has been refered to by the media as an expert on the topics of culture and religion.

His many honors and achievements included a Postdoctoral Fellowship from Brandeis University, National Foundation for Jewish Culture Grant, Faculty Enrichment Award, Faculty Development Award, and Meritorious Performance Award.

Just prior to his untimely death, Friedman presented a paper, "Multiculturalism: Interpreting the Corporate American Version," at the annual meeting of the California Sociological Association, Riverside, CA, Oct. 24, 1998.

"Besides being a dedicated teacher, he was a member of the Screen Actors Guild and appeared in a number of television commercials and movies, including Arnold Schwarzenegger's *The Terminator*," said **Lawrence Hong**, chair of the Sociology Department.

He is survived by his wife, Susan, who is also on the Sociology faculty, and daughters, Rebecca and Shana.
