2000 CSU Bautzer Faculty



Garlos Robles (*Biology and Microbiology*) was recently named the University's fifth Bautzer Faculty at the CSUAdvancement Academy Conference in Long Beach. The Bautzer Faculty University Advancement Award enables faculty to learn more about professional university development at national conferences and CSU workshops throughout the year.

The awards were established in 1996 as a result of a gift from Nicola D. Bautzer (in memory of her husband Gregson Bautzer, a member of the CSU Board of Trustees and the CSU Foundation Board of Governors) and matching funds from the CSU Advancement Academy, to recognize the importance of the involvement of faculty members in CSU advancement efforts, particularly among alumni and within local communities.

Robles received his Ph.D. at UC Berkeley and joined the Cal State L.A. faculty as professor of biology in 1988. Since then, he had held several positions at the University, including acting associate dean of Graduate Studies and Research, and both associate and acting chair for the Department of Biology and Microbiology.

Robles is the director of the newlyformed Center for Environmental Analysis (CEA-CREST). The Center is the first of its kind funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF) on the West Coast.

Professor Receives ASCAPLU\$ Award

John M. Kennedy (*Music*) was the recent recipient of a 2000-2001 ASCAPLU\$ Standard Award. ASCAPLU\$ is a unique awards program that provides both cash and recognition to many active writers of music in the early stages of their careers as well as to established composers whose main activity is outside broadcast media.

The cash awards, made by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP), reflect continuing commitment to assist and encourage writers of serious music.

Kennedy joined the Cal State L.A. faculty in 1994. An assistant professor in the Department of Music, he is also director of Cal State L.A.'s Pacific Contemporary Music Center (PCMC), which presents new and diverse works of music by Pacific Rim composers to the community.



Kennedy, whose expertise is in composition and 20th century music, lectures regulary for the Los Angeles Philharmonic UpBeat Live preconcert series. Three of his most recent works will be premiered this season, including a new work for soprano and chamber orchestra. His work can be heard on Vienna Modern Masters (VMM 3032) and is available from ILC Publishing, Los Angeles.

UAS Building Schedule



The new University Auxiliary Services building has been envisioned as a "one-stop shop" for the campus community, with a food court equipped to serve approximately 750 people, a banquet/conference center with state-of-the-art technology for 600, and a two-story Barnes & Noble West Coast showcase campus bookstore. UAS administrative offices and the Division of Extended Education's American Culture and Language Program will be among the tenants of the new building.

The facility that houses Eagles' Landing (cafeteria), the University Club and banquet rooms (Oak and Palm) will officially close on **Friday**, **December 22**, **2000**—the day after the University's Christmas Party.

Campus will be closed starting December 25, 2000 and will reopen January 2, 2001.

Temporary provisions:

Temporary food service areas have been designated in **Parking Lot B** (south of Bio Sci) and the **northeast corner of Library North** (currently the location of the catering truck). These temporary locations will be in operation on **January 2**, the first day of Winter quarter 2001. **Lot B tent:**

An elongated dome-shaped, fully-enclosed tent will be situated at Lot B, and will contain tables and chairs to accommodate approximately 200. Up to three catering trucks will arrive daily (Monday through Friday) and park alongside the tent, at three roll-up doors. Access to the trucks will be from inside the tent. There will be a structure with six full restrooms (two of which are ADA-compliant) located outside, close to the tent.

Library North, NE corner:

At the northeast corner of Library North, the seating area will be expanded to accommodate 100 people. Seating will be available underneath the library overhang as well as in part of the open area on the northside walkway (along the wall). Up to two trucks will be situated at this location.

Hours of operation:

The temporary hours of operation will mirror regular Eagles' Landing hours. During **Fall**, **Winter and Spring quarters** these are: **Monday through Thursday**, 7 **a.m. to 7 p.m.** and **Friday from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m.** (During Summer quarter, hours will be: Monday through Thursday from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Friday from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m.) Food service will not be in operation during scheduled University holidays. Operation will be scaled down during regular quarter breaks. **Demolition:**

Demolition of the cafeteria building scheduled for March 2001 (specific date to be announced), with construction immediately following. The facility will be completely vacated in January 2001 and will be prepared for demolition during February. **Construction:**

Student Olympians

Ouise Ayetotche, current member of the Golden Eagles Track & Field team—who represented her home country, the Ivory Coast, at the 2000 Olympics—ran a second national record (Ivory Coast) time in two days of 22.76 in the 200 meter dash, finishing in 9th place. In the preliminary heat, she ran 22.85, a record to that point.

Tawny Banh, a senior in Business Administration, represented the U.S. in the 2000 Olympics in Table Tennis singles and doubles. Although she did not advance beyond the first level of competition, she may be the only Cal State L.A. student who competed for the U.S. this year. She graduated from Alhambra High School in 1994, the same year she entered Cal State L.A. Born in Vietnam, she is the youngest of six siblings.
