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New Director of Public Safety Hired

n March 2, Chief **Greg King** joined the Cal State L.A. community as the new director of public safety.

Until recently, King served as director of college support service at Golden West



College in Huntington Beach, California, with direct supervision over public safety, graphics, computer services, audio visual, mailroom, and PBX telephone departments.

With 24 years of criminal justice experience in directing police divisions, King has been responsible for uniform patrol, criminal investigations, communications, records, public information, and crime prevention and research in both a municipal and an educational setting. He has served as a municipal public information officer, and has developed a community policing program for city application that established and maintained open communication between citizens and multiple departments.

As chief and director of public safety at Cal State L.A., King will oversee all police functions at the University. He will also be responsible for enforcing parking and traffic regulations, providing crowd control and maintaining security for campus property, as well as offering emergency assistance to the University community.

King earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from National-Louis University in Evanston, Illinois, and is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation National Academy. He currently serves as a consultant for the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, a national organization that provides professional policing standards.

The January 1998 issue of TPQ (vol. 18, no. 1) and the Fall 1997 issue of Journal of Film and Video (vol. 49, no. 3) were edited, respectively, by Communication Studies chair/Professor of Speech Communication Judith Hamera, and Professor of Broadcasting Suzanne Regan. Hamera was recently named editor of TPQ and will serve in that capacity through the year 2000. Regan began her tenure as editor of the Journal of Film and Video in summer, 1997, and will serve through 2002.

Formerly known as Literature in Perfor-

mance, *TPQ* is the National Communication Association journal of performance studies. Widely regarded as the "cutting edge" journal of critical theory and cultural studies, *TPQ* is the only such peerreviewed journal in the United States. Its editorial board is composed of leading scholars in the discipline from national and international research universities.

Communication Studies graduate students are involved in all aspects of the journal's production, says Hamera. Grad students **Tom Burkhart** and **Josh Miller**, whose names appear in the January issue, are the journal's editorial assistants. Manuscripts from the journal, used as "blind review" active learning exercises, provide many graduate students in contemporary rhetoric and performance studies
