New unit to patrol campus



The University Police has recently formed a Motorcycle Unit consisting of two officers: Corporals **Ulysses A. Gutierrez** (r) and **John Martin** (l). The Unit is responsible for the enforcement of traffic laws and the investigation of traffic collisions that occur on campus roadways, parking

According to University Police Chief Joseph Curreri, the goal is to make the campus roadways safe for vehicles and pedestrians through education and directed enforcement of traffic violations. He said, "The unit also supplements other patrol units in the prevention and investigation of crime."

The Kawasaki KZ-1000 police motorcycles are equipped with the same emergency equipment as police vehicles. One of the other benefits of these police motorcycles is that they can access many areas on campus that are not readily available to cars, providing faster response times to calls for service.

Both officers, who are skilled in riding motorcycles, attended a motorcycle academy sponsored by the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Emergency Vehicle Operations Center. The rigorous two-week training course offers lessons in specialized motorcycle skills and riding techniques. The officers are also trained in the use of Radar/Lidar for conducting speed enforcement

Health and Human Services

The Department of Child and Family Studies has expanded the Pathways program to increase student retention and success. The program, under the direction of **Rita Ledesma**, employs a peer mentoring approach combined with a variety of best practices in student retention to ensure the timely graduation and

CSULA is part of a pipeline program funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to support underrepresented students in earning graduate degrees that will help address health disparities. With Dean **Beatrice Yorker** as the principal investigator, the grant also provides summer internships in Los Angeles for students in public health, which includes travel to the CDC and Kennedy Krieger Institute at Johns Hopkins University.

The College of Health and Human Services, along with the Charter College of Education, launched a new minor in Developmental Disabilities in response to increasing awareness of the lifelong impact of developmental disabilities. The minor includes course selections from a variety of majors as well as internship opportunities at Children's Hospital Los Angeles and other service agencies.

Natural and Social Sciences

This summer, Cal State L.A. faculty and students will join the Coastal California Climate Change Research Project, a collaborative research effort sponsored by National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Cooperative Remote Sensing Science and Technology Center, to investigate the implications of climate change along the California coast. New research indicates that global warming may lead to hotter conditions and more heat waves inland, but possibly stronger sea breeze and cooling along the immediate coast. The summer researchers will gather atmospheric data across Southern California using both Jet Propulsion Laboratory high altitude flyovers and ground-based sensors. Investigators at CSULA include **Paula Arved**son (Curriculum and Instruction), Steve LaDochy and Pedro Ramirez (Geosciences and Environment), along with graduate and undergraduate student researchers.

Cal State L.A., Cal Poly Pomona and San Diego State partnered to offer a new online (four course) certificate in Clinical Trials Project Management. The courses have been developed by regulatory and industry professionals to teach the management of product development for Food and Drug Administration approval. Cal State L.A. to welcome new deans



Eunsook Hyun, an established scholar and experienced administrator in higher education, has been named as dean of the Charter College of Education, effective June 1. Hyun will be chief academic, fiscal and administrative officer of the College.

Prior to Cal State L.A., Hyun was a professor of curriculum studies and associate provost at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, where she also served as department chair of curriculum and instruction. She was previously program director and co-director of graduate and undergraduate programs in the College of Education at Kent State



Jun Xing, a scholar of ethnic studies, American studies and Asian studies, has been named dean of Undergraduate Studies, effective July 15. Xing will oversee the development and implementation of programs and policies related to undergraduate student success. He will also be responsible for the CSU Early Start program.

Since 2002, Xing has been a professor in the Department of Ethnic Studies at Oregon State University. He is currently assisting Hong Kong's Polytechnic University in Kowloon, and the region's eight public universities in their transition to a four-year U.S.-style undergraduate program.

Presidential honoree is keynote speaker



Hoping to inspire current CSULA students to become successful alums in their respective fields, Alejandro (Alex) Briseño. '00. '04. assistant professor of the Department of Polymer

Science and Engineering at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, will deliver this year's Honors Convocation keynote speech.

Briseño was named by President Barack Obama as a recipient of the 2012 Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers, the highest honor bestowed by the U.S. Government to individuals in the early stages of their independent research careers.

Student Success

Thanks to the Student Success Fee (SSF), we now have a total of 45 staff advisers in place. With this significant investment in advisement, we have gone from a ratio of over 1,600 students per staff adviser to under 500. The SSF has also provided additional funding for tutoring and student engagement in their academic majors. For graduate students, we have improved and provided thesis completion assistance, tutoring in writing, and stipends for research.

In collaboration with Student Affairs and Information Technology Services, we are also looking to implement a critical student success tool for course scheduling and planning. This tool will enable a better alignment between student course demand, class schedule and classroom capacity, and assist in ensuring that the University is providing students with the classes they need to graduate.

Another key ingredient for student success is faculty support. To that end, the building of our infrastructure capacity to support faculty through the revitalized Center for Effective Teaching and Learning (CETL) has been, and will continue to be, one of the key drivers for Cal State L.A. in becoming an engaged University. CETL offers weekly themed programming on teaching and learning, accessibility, program review, and academic technology.

Community Engagement

Mike Willard, faculty director for community-based learning, is coordinating several activities that will improve engagement of our faculty and students with the community. In addition, we are continuing our work to build meaningful alliances with community partners.

Collaborative Culture

I will continue to host "Campus Conversations" with the faculty—a coffee hour devoted to discussion of various issues and topics of interest. The intent is to focus on interdisciplinary interactions, to share new ideas, and to discuss strategies for institutional growth. There are still two coffee hours remaining on Apr. 17 and May 22, both from 9-10 a.m. I look forward to making these conversations a regular occurrence on campus.
