### **CAMPUS FACT:**

Cal State L.A. has recently exceeded the target set by the Chancellor's Office for incoming transfer four-year graduation rates as part of the CSU Graduation Initiative. According to a recent report compiled by the university's Institutional Research office, graduation rates for the fall 2009 cohort has increased to 64 percent (surpassing the 57 percent target). Underrepresented transfer students in that cohort have increased to 63 percent (surpassing the 56 percent target).

## Faculty recognized at fall program

As part of the annual Fall Faculty Day tradition, Cal State L.A. recognized a group of faculty scholars for their superlative teaching and exceptional commitment to students as well as professional accomplishments and services.

This year's Cal State L.A. President's Distinguished Professor Award was presented to **Enrique Ochoa** (pictured), a respected historian, a community activist and a published author who writes about Latin America issues.

A professor of history and Latin American studies, Ochoa is highly regarded for his research focusing on the processes of state building, globalization, resistance, and migration. His award-winning book, *Feeding Mexico: The Political* 

Uses of Food Since 1910 (2000), examined the politics of state intervention in the economy and its connection to the rise and demise of the social welfare state during the 20th Century. Ochoa also published regarding critical and innovative approaches to teaching Latin American Studies and history in the classroom and in communities. He has served on the national steering committee of Historians Against the War, and is currently a member of the board of directors of the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights-Los Angeles.

The Outstanding Professor Awards went to:

- John Kennedy, a composer whose work has been premiered nationally and internationally:
- Matthias Selke, an internationally-known chemist and a devoted mentor who involves undergraduate and graduate students in his interdisciplinary scientific research programs;
- Kaveri Subrahmanyam, a nationally-recognized expert in development psychology who has been published widely and quoted frequently by local and national media; and
- Nancy Warter-Perez, a distinguished computer engineer who has been dedicated to improving science, technology, engineering and math education and outreach, particularly for underrepresented minorities.

And, the Outstanding Lecturer Award was presented to **Kathleen Hinoki** who has more than 35 years of professional experience in pediatric nursing.

# Cal State L.A. among nation's top 20

Washington Monthly's 2013 College Guide has listed Cal State L.A. among the nation's top 20 master's universities, based on social mobility (recruiting and graduating low-income students), research (producing cutting-edge scholarship and Ph.D.s), and service (encouraging students to give something back to their country). Impressively, Cal State L.A. is ranked 6th nationally in the category of social mobility, which is tied in part to how a university exceeds a predicted graduation rate based on the socioeconomic status of the student population. The university is also among the top 20 percent in the research category and the top 25 percent in the service category.

### Formula team takes first place

Cal State L.A.'s Formula Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) team recently won first place in the first-ever California Challenge, which is part of the U.S. Department of Energy Solar Decathlon 2013 and XPO. The competition challenged high school and university students to race on an autocross course in either the Formula, electric, or fuel-efficient class.
