## **CSULA students get better mileage!**

First in the nation, second in the world!

Carrying on CSULA's tradition of national #1 award-winning student-built alternative-energy vehicles, the **Super Eagle**—CSULA's newest competitive super-mileage car—beat 39 collegiate teams from the U.S. and Canada in the Society of Automo-



tive Engineers (SAE) international Supermileage® competition in June.

Besting cars from UC campuses to a specialized technology institute, the superblyengineered car achieved a record 1,615 mpg.

"You could get to Las Vegas for 29¢ and Sacramento for 55¢ on that kind of mileage!", emphasized associate dean **Martin Roden** (*Electrical Engineering*), echoing the exhilaration of the entire College of Engineering, Computer Science, and Technology.

**James Ettaro** (*Technology*) has been the project's faculty advisor and guiding force since his arrival on campus seven years ago. Recognized by SAE as the Outstanding SAE Faculty Advisor of 2004, Ettaro teaches and conducts research in power, energy and transportation and manages the Power-Energy-Transportation program housed in the College of Engineering, Computer Science, and Technology.

Significant changes for this year's entry made the difference: an advanced electronic fuel injection system, aerodynamic carbon fiber-Kevlar-aluminum composite body, and an ultra high efficiency engine.

## Gerontology award

Connie Corley (Social Work), director of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute and



associate director of research for the Roybal Institute for Gerontology, was honored with the inaugural Career Gerontological Social Work Recognition Award

by the Institute for Geriatric Social Work, during the American Society on Aging Summer Series meeting. At the meeting, she presented a talk, "Mentoring in Aging: Getting into the Field, and Staying in It!"

Corley serves as a national mentor to the John A. Hartford Foundation's Faculty Scholars Program and was a consultant at the inception of its renowned Geriatric Social Work Initiative. She served as president of the Association for Gerontology Education in Social Work and is now a member of the Board. She is a fellow of the Gerontological Society of America and the Association for Gerontology in Higher Education. Corley's Social Work Response to the 1995 White House Conference on Aging has become a popular text in gerontology courses throughout the country.

"There can be no question that since Dr. Corley began her social work career in the early 1980s, she has become a national leader in the profession," says her nominator, James D. Kelly, former dean of the College of Health and Human Services, who is now associate vice president of extended education at CSU Hayward.

## Nursing faculty member in Germany



Lorie Judson (Nursing) is now serving with the Army Nurse Corps, Army Reserve, as the officer-in-charge

(OIC) of triage at the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany.

Major Judson, who has been deployed until July 2005, cares for soldiers with injuries suffered in either Afghanistan or Iraq.

An expert in pediatric chronic and acute illness, Judson is coordinator of

the University's Pediatric Acute Care Nurse Practitioner Program.

Judson writes: "Although I miss my family, students and colleagues, I am proud to be a part of a team that cares for our wounded and ill soldiers."

Despite her full schedule, Judson recently had two of her manuscripts published: "Global Chronic Childhood Illness" in *Nursing Administration Quarterly* and "Protective Care: Mothering a Child Dependent on Parenteral Nutrition" in *Journal of Family Nursing*.

## Cybersex survey conceived by sociology professor

ELLE.com and MSNBC.com recently announced results of a comprehensive online Cybersex and Romance Survey conceived by **Janet Lever** (Sociology), and completed by more than 15,000 men and women.

The results—published in the June issue of *ELLE* magazine and available online on MSNBC.com's health pages—reveal a new stage in the sexual revolution that is changing and challenging the rules of flirtation, commitment and intimacy.

According to Lever, personals and match sites have changed the way people are "hooking up," and cyberporn is redefining how we see our bodies and our partners. The data provide an overview of how the Web has affected sex and ro-



mance. "It's clear that the dire ill effects of Internet sex we hear about happen to just a small percentage of Web-sex users," says Lever. "For most.

online erotica does more good than harm, strengthening bonds between partners, easing their communication, and kindling the sparks that keep sex interesting."

This is the sixth mass media survey written and analyzed by Lever, who coauthored *Glamour* magazine's "Sex and Health" column from 1991 through 1998. In 2002, ELLE.com and MSNBC.com posted Lever's first click-and-tell survey researching workplace sex and romance.

## Geography professors to work at JPL this summer

This summer, **Hengchun Ye** and **Steve LaDochy** (Geography and Urban Analysis) are both at JPL in the 2004 NASA Faculty Fellowship Program.

They were selected from among 762 scientists nationwide for this program, which pairs selected university and college faculty with NASA scientists to work on research projects of mutual interests.

Ye is working on the AIRS (Atmospheric Infrared Sounder) project, using data from the instruments flying aboard NASA's weather and climate research satellite, Aqua. This is the first

spaceborne instrument designed specifically to measure global climate change. Her research has focused on recent climate change in the Arctic.

LaDochy, who held faculty fellowships

at JPL (2000, 2001 and 2003), continues with his research collaboration with oceanographer Bill Patzert and CSULA geography graduate student **Jeff Brown**. Their research deals with modeling longrange weather and climate

predictions for the western U.S. based on air-sea interactions, such as El Niño and PDO (Pacific Decadal Oscillation).

## "Top 100" rankings

Cal State L.A. ranked #3 on the *Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education*'s 14th annual "Top 100"—moving up from a fifth place listing last year. Cal State L.A. continues to be the highest ranked among institutions in California that conferred the most bachelor's degrees to Hispanics.

In awarding the most master's degrees to Hispanics, Cal State L.A. was ranked **#9**, moving up from #13 last year, among the top 100 colleges and universities in this ranking.



#### In memoriam

**Bill Schatz**, husband-father-minister-campus ombudsman-teacher-diver-friend, died at his home in South Lake Tahoe on June 4 of colon cancer.

Schatz, born in Evansville, Indiana, graduated from Elmhurst College and Eden

Theological Seminary. He was ordained in June 1957, and was founding pastor of two Southerm California churches. He also served as the United Ministries in Higher



Education campus minister to Cal State L.A. from 1966 to 1968. Since 1978, Schatz was principal, with his wife Judi, of G/S Consultants, training counselors and human resources professionals in the use of psychological tests.

## English professor garners prestigious prosody award

A nationally-recognized poet and an Outstanding Professor, **Timothy Steele** (English) was presented the prestigious Robert Fitzgerald Prosody



Award at the tenth annual West Chester Poetry Conference. The Fitzgerald award is unique among literary and academic prizes in recognizing scholars who have made a lasting contribution to the art and science of versification.

At the award presentation, Thomas Cable,

English professor at the University of Texas, Austin, praised Professor Steele and his work: "Since 1979, Timothy Steele has published nine books of poetry and two books of prosodical history and metrical analysis. He has also written many articles and reviews of and about poetry, and he has edited the poems of J.V. Cunningham (1997).

"The strands of these many publications, all of them at a high level of excellence, weave themselves together in natural ways, though the point of focus and celebration for the Robert Fitzgerald

Prosody Award is specifically the metrical scholarship, especially in the two books, *Missing Measures: Modern Poetry and the Revolt against Meter* (1990) and *All the Fun's in How You Say a Thing* (1999).

Named after the noted Harvard professor and translator of the Homeric epics, the Fitzgerald Award was established at the Fifth Conference on Poetry and Poetics in 1999. It has since honored five metrists who shaped the subject in the second half of the 20th century: Derek Attridge, T. V. A. Brogan, Edward Weismiller, Paul Fussell, and George T. Wright.
