



'Early Start' to boost math, English skills

• What is the new CSU Early Start program?

Starting fall 2012, the CSU system has enacted a policy and program known as "Early Start," requiring incoming freshmen who do not demonstrate readiness for college-level math and/or English to begin remediation the summer before coming to the CSU each fall.

• What are the goals of the Early Start program?

Early Start aims to better prepare students in math and English before their first year, thereby improving their chances of completing a college degree.

• Who must participate in Early Start?

Students who score low on the Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) and/or the English Placement Test (EPT), or other assessment methods will be informed by Cal State L.A. that they need to attend Early Start, how and where to sign up (after they submit their Enrollment Confirmation Deposit, which is required of all newlyadmitted students).

• Where are Early Start courses offered?

Students participating in Early Start may attend courses at the campus where they were admitted, at any other CSU, or at a community college. The standard fee is \$182 per unit, but the CSU will waive this fee for students who demonstrate need in their application for financial aid. At CSULA, one online course in English composition will be offered twice this summer, July 2-11 and July 30-Aug. 8. There will also be six courses in precollege mathematics offered this summer.
