Philip G. Allen (Sound Design) is a sound designer, mixer and audio educator with more than 30 years of professional experience. He has designed permanent sound systems for the Music Center of Los Angeles, the Kirk Douglas Theatre in Culver City and numerous smaller venues. His television credits include sound system design and equalization for the 56th and 59th Golden Globe Awards and the 33rd Academy of Country Music Awards. On film he contributed the sound design to the feature film Soultaker. As a theatrical designer he has



designed more than 100 theatrical shows, including Six Dance Lessons in Six Weeks on Broadway; the 2002 to 2005 national tour of Jesus Christ Superstar starring Carl Anderson; Spamalot, Hair, Chicago & The Producers at The Hollywood Bowl; The Ten Commandments starring Val Kilmer at the KodakTheatre; The Creature From The Black Lagoon at Universal Studios Hollywood; Measure for Measure, Midsummer Night's Dream, and Cinderella at the Ahmanson Theatre; Harps & Angels, Pippin, The House of Blue Leaves, The Talking Cure, Like Jazz, Big River, Flower Drum Song and First Picture Show at the Mark Taper Forum; and all fifteen seasons of the Reprise Theatre Company's productions at UCLA's Freud Playhouse. Other design work includes PaintYour Wagon, Six Dance Lessons In Six Weeks and Ain't Nothin' But the Blues at the GeffenPlayhouse; Casa Valentina, Smokey Joe's Café, Under My Skin, Art, Play On, Only a Kingdom, and Blame it on the Movies at the Pasadena Playhouse; Masada at the Shubert Theatre in LA; Forever Plaid and Blues in the Night at the Coconut Grove Playhouse in Miami; and the US workshop productions of the musical Zorro with music by John Cameron and the Gipsy Kings. On Broadway, he assisted long-time design partner Jon Gottlieb on 2001's If You Ever Leave Me I'm

Coming With You. He served as Production Sound Engineer for Jason Robert Brown's *13* at the Taper, *Thoroughly Modern Millie* at La Jolla Playhouse, and was the head soundman for the national tours of *Titanic*, The Pointer Sister's *Ain't Misbehavin' and Man of La Mancha* with Robert Goulet. He won the 2009 NAACP award for Sound Design for *Once On This Island*, 2003 NAACP award for Sound Design for *Jesus Christ Superstar*, the 2001 Ovation Award for *Flower Drum Song*, and the 1999 LA Drama Critics Circle Award for *Cinderella*, as well as five LA Dramalogue Awards for Outstanding Achievement in Sound Design, and two Ovation Award nominations for Best Sound Design. Mr. Allen created the BFA Sound Design and VoiceOver Acting curricula at the USC School of Dramatic Arts where he serves as an Associate Professor. He has also taught graduate design courses at UCLA and Cal Arts.



Stephen Rothman (Director) is a Tenured Full Professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance here at California State University, Los Angeles having joined the faculty in 2001. He is best known by West Coast Theatre audiences for his work as founder and artistic leader of the revitalized Pasadena Playhouse. He also served as artistic director of the Sacramento Theatre Company. His directing career has taken him across the country and around the world, including a 2008 production of Harold Pinter's

BETRAYAL in Florence, Italy for the Florence International Theatre Company. Rothman's American Resident/Regional Theatre credits include more than 100 plays in 16 different States for 40 different theatre companies. He is especially proud of his work on numerous world premieres including SPARKY AND THE FITZ starring Academy Award winner Eli Wallach at the George Street Playhouse in New Jersey, LEARN TO FALL starring France's awardwinning clown/artist Buffo at The Attic Theatre in Detroit, GILLIGAN'S ISLAND, THE MUSICAL for Chicago's Organic Theatre and FATHER, SON, AND HOLY COACH for the Santa Monica Playhouse to name just a few. Included among Rothman's most recent directorial work is the 2020 World Premiere of BLOODLESS as well as the 2019 production of THE UNSEEN HAND both here at Cal State LA. Additional recent shows include the 2017 production of CAT'S PAW for Actor's Co-op here in Los Angeles. And prior to that was the March 2015 production of AMERICAN BUFFALO for Deaf West Theatre. The play was named a "Critics Choice" by the LA TIMES, LA WEEKLY, and BACKSTAGE. And that show was revived for a December 2017 production at CATCO in Columbus, Ohio where it received critical

and audience acclaim as well. Rothman has had the privilege of collaborating with Deaf West Theatre since 1994 and other American Sign Language (ASL) productions he has directed with the company include: OF MICE AND MEN, ORPHANS, WHAT ARE YOU...DEAF?, and PINOCCHIO. Other work Rothman is particularly proud of includes a residency in the summer of 2013 at Shakespeare and Company in Lenox, Massachusetts where he directed both the World Professional Premiere of LEAP YEAR in addition to the play ACCOMPLICE. Among the theatre awards Rothman has received include winning Florida's Carbonell Award for "Best Director" for GOD'S MAN IN TEXAS at Florida Stage as well as a Los Angeles Dramalogue win for his direction of an American Sign Language production of ORPHANS for Deaf West Theatre. And most recently (November 2017) he was awarded the 2016-2017 STAGE SCENE LA award for "Outstanding Direction, Drama/Intimate Theatre" for his work on CAT'S PAW at Actor's Co-op. For American television, Rothman had the good fortune of spending two seasons directing episodes of THE NEW WKRP IN CINCINNATI. At California State University, Los Angeles Rothman served as the two term Chair of the Department of Theatre Arts and Dance and he received the 2012/2013 University Award as "The Outstanding Professor of the Year." In spring 2015 he was granted a sabbatical award and both taught classes and created an original 8-episode sitcom at The Stockholm Academy of Dramatic Arts in Sweden. Rothman is a proud 36-year member of The Society of Director's and Choreographers (SDC) where he also served for 8 years on their Executive Board. He has been a member of the Director's Guild of America (DGA) for 28 years. Additionally, Rothman is an invited member of the National Theatre Conference (NTC), a former 8 year Tony Award voter, a member of the Association of Theatrical Press Agents and Managers (ATPAM), a Trustee of the Pension and Health Fund for the Society of Stage Director's and Choreographers, and He serves on the Advisory Board for the British Academic Journal COMEDY STUDIES. Rothman's alumni awards include being named a University "Grad Made Good" at Florida State University as well as having the honor in November 2018 of being named to the "Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame" at Riverview High School in Sarasota, Florida, his childhood home. While Rothman truly loves his life in the arts his most fun production continues to be his son Will "Banno" Rothman who provides him with the best living theatre possible.
